Question of the Week November 5, 2023



All catechesis flows from the liturgy nothing is as important as what happens at the Sunday Mass. ### NATIONAL BLACK CATHOLIC HISTORY MONTH

The National Black Catholic Clergy Caucus (NBCCC) of the United States voted on Tuesday, July 24, 1990 while meeting in convention at Fordham University in New York, to establish November as BLACK CATHOLIC HISTORY MONTH. The reason behind the selection of the month of November was the number of important dates to Catholics of African descent that fell within this month.

**Nov. 1 All Saints Day:** an opportunity to review the lives of the hundreds of Saints of African descent in the first 300 years of the Church.#


**Nov. 2 All Souls Day:** a time to remember all those African lost to cruel treatment in the Middle Passage crossing of the Atlantic Ocean.#

**Nov. 3 Martin de Porres** became the first black American saint. He was canonized by Pope John XXIII on May 16, 1962. Throughout his life, St. Martin de Porres exemplified God's love for all people, regardless of their level in society.#

**Nov. 13 The birth of St. Augustine** in 354 A.D., the first Doctor of the Church from North Africa.#

**Nov. 20 The death of Zumbi of Palmares** in Brazil, South American founder of a free state for Blacks.#

The first celebration of Black Catholic History Month began in November of 1990 in various cities in the United States with the celebration of St. Martin de Porres Feast day. The liturgy celebrated the 350th anniversary of St. Martin's transition from this life to eternal life. In Detroit on this day in 1990, Archbishop Adam Maida, the local Archbishop, was the celebrant for the Mass. Also present was the President of the NBCCC, Bro. Roy Smith, OSC. The Mass was held at St. Anthony Church. In the world today there are 200 million people of African descent in the Roman Catholic Church throughout the world.



#### Who was the first African mentioned in the Gospels?

The first African, in the New Testament, was mentioned in the Gospel of Matthew, Simon of Cyrene (Matthew 27:32). Simon was pressed into service to carry the cross of Jesus This event is highlighted in the fifth station of the cross.

### Did you know about these African people?

**St. Zeno** was bishop of Verona in Italy. He died in 372.

**St. Maurice** and a group of Ethiopian Christian soldiers called the "Theban Legion" belong to the Roman army. In the Middle Third Century, this group while serving in Switzerland were told to take part in a heathen service, but refused. The group was later butchered.

**St. Moses the Black** was a convert and leader of a band of monks in the desert who were martyred about 410. He was one of the most influential monks in the world. Because of Moses the Black, many women and men sought a life of prayer in the desert in the cenobitic style of sharing meals and community in Upper Egypt and Ethiopia.

**St. Monica** was the Mother of St. Augustine. Monica was an African woman of great faith who prayed for her son to turn against evil. Before her death, Monica had the great joy of knowing that her son had come back to God and used his talents to build up Christ's Church.

**St. Augustine** was born in Tagaste, Africa, and was the son of Monica. At the age of 33 he turned back to God and was baptized Catholic. Augustine was later ordained a priest and later Co-Bishop of Hippo. He led a holy and simple life, writing over 200 books, letters, and sermons. His writings are still read today. St. Augustine's feast day is August 28.

**Bl. Pierre Toussaint** was a slave who after freedom performed extraordinary works.
